Invitation to Roundtable Discussion: June 19th 10am-noon, Jabulani Dome Progressing Toward a Socially Just Green Economy



One of the highlights of President Cyril Ramphosa's February 7th State of the Nation (SONA) address was his politically timeous announcement of the discovery of previously unknown reserves of oil and gas just off South African shores. This news was well-received by national policy makers keen to capitalise on a new and much needed source of national revenue, as well as citizens who associate such developments with new opportunities for employment. Perhaps ironically that evening, Cape Town, where SONA was delivered, was roasting at a temperature of 36 degrees Celsius, having only recently barely averted Day Zero, a water scarcity crisis widely acknowledged to have been caused in great part by climate change. This panel aims to bring together members of the academic, civil society, policy, and private sectors to discuss how to coordinate effective responses to the realities of climate change in South Africa, given the urgent and obvious impacts on South African citizens, and on the poor in particular. The aim of the discussion is twofold. One is to raise the profile within the academy of ongoing transdisciplinary work to promote a socially just green transformation within South Africa. The other is to generate a strategic transdisciplinary discussion on whether and how it might be possible to cooperate to generate innovative, coordinated approaches to balancing South Africa's need for economic growth, with creating opportunities for climate-friendly employment and income generation that benefit the most vulnerable segments of society.

Dr. Hali Healy, University of Johannesburg (Chair)

Dr. Hali Healy is a lecturer at UJ in the Department of Anthropology and Development Studies, who has co-authored and co-ordinated transdisciplinary work between international scholars and activists on sustainable development. On the basis of work with the EJOLT network (www.ejolt.org), Hali has published several articles and co-edited a book, *Ecological Economics from the Ground. Up* (Routledge, 2013). Her PhD (King's College London, Geography), is entitled "The Political Ecology of Transdisciplinary Research: From Co-optation to Unintended Consequences?". Hali's areas of interest are green economies, environmental justice, and the political ecology of solid waste management.
